appy New Year to all! Last year, Sacramento Betsuin celebrated its significant milestone—the 125th anniversary—with great success, thanks to your generous support. However, this milestone is not a goal but a waypoint. We will continue to enrich our programs so that Sacramento Betsuin and Marysville Buddhist Church remains an important place in your lives. We may occasionally ask for your support again, and we kindly ask for your continued assistance.

Now, speaking of the New Year, "Osechi" has long been a Japanese tradition. How is it these days? Even in my generation, the custom of preparing and eating Osechi has been fading, and future generations may practice it even less. So, what exactly is Osechi? Originally, it was an offering to Toshigami-sama,

the deity of the New Year, and each dish was imbued with symbolic meaning.

For example, "black soybeans" are meant to ward off evil and represent diligence. "Kazunoko (herring roe)" symbolizes prosperity and the continuation of descendants, and "kuri-kinton (sweet chestnut paste)" represents wealth. I suppose, through food, people made wishes to Toshiga*mi-sama*. These dishes aren't necessarily mandatory New Year's foods, but it seems Japanese people love the idea of "observing omens." The term "observing

omens" (げんを担ぐ, gen wo katsugu) originally stemmed from "carrying good fortune" (engi o katsugu). During the Edo period, a trend of reversing syllables turned "engi" into "gien" (akin to how "sushi" is sometimes jokingly reversed to "shisu"), which later became shortened to "gen." Interestingly, when "gen" is written as 験, it means the "effect" or "efficacy" of Buddhist practice. Well, I was wondering... have

you ever observed omens before?

However, the practice of observing omens or praying to deities carries the risk of thinking, "I'm safe because I observed an omen" or "Everything will be fine because I prayed." Conversely, it can also lead to thoughts like, "I observed an omen, but things didn't go well," or "I prayed, but it didn't work." This mindset shifts responsibility for one's situation onto external factors, which is not aligned with Buddhist thought.

In Buddhism, engi (interdependent origination) refers to in-nen-sho-ki (因 緣生起): "Arising through causes and conditions." It emphasizes that every event has a cause. Misunderstanding engi—interpreting it as something superstitious, such as "the strap on my sandal broke, so it's bad luck"may have given rise to the mindset of observing omens. Nonetheless, recognizing that all phenomena arise from a web of causes and conditions allows us neither to rejoice nor lament over

a single event, such as a broken sandal strap. Our current state is the result of countless factors.

The Buddha's realization is sometimes expressed through the teaching of the Twelvefold Chain of Causation. This teaching traces our present state back to a fundamental cause called "ignorance." One might question whether this implies a singular cause. However, Buddhism describes our current condition as one of delusion. The Buddha taught that the root of this delusion lies in a state of ignorance where one, lacking wisdom, arbitrarily determines causes without understanding the true nature of reality. I could say that the key lies in the self-centered, arbitrary nature of this determination.

In the wasan by Shinran Shonin mentioned earlier, we find the words, "How lamentable it is that monks and laypeople Select 'fortunate times' and 'auspicious days'. In

Reflections on the Bodhi Day and December Shotsuki Service

ev. Kelvin Mark was the officiating minister at our Bodhi Day and December Shotsuki Service held on Sunday, December 8th. Through his Dharma Talk, he shared his perspective on why we chant. I do not know how many times I have heard people ask, "Why do we chant?" Here is an excerpt from his Dharma Talk that addresses his view as to our lives, practice makes

why we chant.

Why do we chant? Our hope, as teachers, during chanting, is actually threefold:

- 1. Meditation In helping to calm and settle our minds, so that we can tune out the myriad distractions of day to day life, sit calmly among fellow travelers and simply listen, MonPo, to hear earnestly, and to listen to the truth of life.
- 2. Ritually Because our chanting connects us to the traditions and rituals practiced by countless teachers, who walked the earth centuries ago, long before written history.
- 3. The Teaching Aspect When monks chanted the sutras, they learned and memorized them, not because of studying for a test, but because of practice. Just as with anything meaningful that we do in

the activity become one with who we are. We need to learn the contents of what we are chanting so that we can more fully appreciate the teachings laid down before us.

Once Siddhartha attained enlightenment under the Bodhi Tree and became known as the Shakyamuni Buddha, the historical Buddha, his teachings, stories, and legends were first passed down in the Pali language, an oral tradition, shared before the advent of written word. Decades or centuries later, the oral tradition was logged in Sanskrit, enabling the teachings of Amida Buddha to spread far and wide.

From what I can summarize from what Rev. Kelvin was sharing, is that from the time of Siddhartha's enlightenment, the Sutra Chanting we are accustomed to are simply the teachings of the Shakyamuni Buddha that has been translated from Pali to Sanskrit to Japanese characters to Japanese romaji and in some service books into English. I remember there were times when we tried to chant the sutras in English but there was something awkward about it. But when we chant the Sutras in Japanese even though we do not know what it is we are chanting, there's something about the sound, pace, tone, rhythm that truly has a settling effect just as Rev. Kelvin describes in step #1.

Thank you Rev. Kelvin for sharing your Dharma talk at our December 8th service. We truly enjoyed your Dharma message and enjoyed having you and Cheryl part of our Sangha on Bodhi Day!



October/November Notes

ast week the pond temperature was 58 degrees. This morning it is 54. That makes feeding the Koi questionable. The pond is covered over with those things that resemble cheese-puffs. They have been skimmed. The waterfall was just cleaned yesterday, but there are still all sorts of those cheese-puffs up there. They're going to have to wait. I just looked at the tree and it looks like there are a couple of thousand up there yet (great).

The neighbor's cat comes by every day. I learned his name is "Bobo". I called his name out to him the other day and boy did he give me a strange

look. I don't think he's quite figured out how I learned his name. I think he enjoyed the anonymity. He is always welcome here to get a drink or check things out.

The water temperature rose to 55 degrees so I fed the Koi 2/3 of a cup. I am going to have to monitor that for a while and maybe shut down the food for the winter.

We have had a few rain storms lately. After the first one, which was somewhat heavy, we had cheesepuffs everywhere. A million plus. The ones that fell into the pond were waterlogged enough that they sank. It was cleaned somewhat and the rest is going to have to wait. The cheese-puffs that fall onto the small trees have to be picked out by hand.

All the others were cleaned up, 2/3 of a garbage can. The waterfall was cleaned. I found 4 baby Japanese Trap Door Snails up there and returned them to the pond. When the snails are first laid they are the size of a grain of sand and somehow make it past the filter to reach the waterfall.

We're still getting numerous storms and I'm trying to keep up. Scott has been here a couple of times and we're sort of caught up on the garden. The Koi are no longer getting fed and the pond is entering it's winter stage.
