y August 18 Dharma Talk at Sacramento Betsuin was "Questions and Responses,"

Responding to One of the Questions

and I tried to share my understanding to the questions I have received.I didn't respond to some of the questions, but one of the questions I thought it might be interesting to share with everyone here is "How do you think our practice of Jodo Shinshu shapes, and is shaped by, being Buddhists in America in 2024?"

First, let's define what Buddhas and entrust the "practice of Jodo Shin-ourselves to the working shu" is... simply, that is of Namo Amida Butsu to

"recitation of the Name of Amida Buddha/Namo Amida Butsu (= nembutsu)."We are receiving the compassionate calling of Amida Buddha to "come this way [to attain Buddhahood]," and recommendation of Shakyamuni and all other Buddhas to "go this way [to attain Buddhahood]."We follow the calling and recommendation of the Buddhas and entrust ourselves to the working

attain Buddhahood.

Then, what this practice of nembutsu bring us in our daily lives... that is the self-reflection of who we truly are. Our founder Shinran Shonin said "hear the origin and fulfillment of the vow." By hearing why the vow of Amida to grasp and never abandon us had to be established, we realize that it was because of the nature of us possessing afflictions such as greed, anger, envy, ig-

s someone who is continuously learning about religions and their history, the presence of deities is constant. From our postmodern, scientific point of view, it is easy to be dismissive of such beliefs as primitive;

simply attributing this worldview as ignorance of the past. When we look at the technological advances we have made based on the incredible number of discoveries of the physical world in all fields, the position taken of such a lofty attitude is, at the very least, reasonable.

However, when we take a closer look at the state of the world today, perhaps our discoveries are not also without their faults. Rather than disproving the existence of gods, we have simply replaced them with different ones. Day until night, do we not worship

our phones and TVs?Do we not offer our money, the symbol of our labor, at the altar of Netflix and YouTube?Do we not get our insight of the world from prophets and shaman on the news, telling us what the weather will be?The gods may have no faces, and our sacrifices may not be live animals, but all the same, we are participating in a belief system.

And perhaps those in the past had something right all along, for when we attribute human characteristics to natural things, it allows us to empathize with them, to respect them.If we believed that trees, rivers, dirt, and rocks had gods living in them, would we be so quick to displace them?If we knew the ground we walk upon had a heart that was beating, would we fill it up with trash?If the wind had lungs and was breathing, would we be concerned about what we put in the air?

In the texts that we read, it's so easy to skip over the fantastical aspects that seem ridiculous from the logic we have today. But upon a closer reading, it is pointing us to a truth greater than we can imagine.

cleaned the waterfall yesterday which needs to be done every couple of weeks. I noticed it was infested with those miniature shrimps. Thousands of them are washed down the waterfall and the Koi fish absolutely go bananas and they're all there in a feeding frenzy. They love them! I've just about used up the sinking Catfish food and will switch over to the floating food which should keep things even clearer. The pond is showing a buildup of muck so I need to think about removing that again.

Our Kingfisher bird was here this morning. First time I've seen him in a

while which might have something to do with our Blackbirds moving off. They had a smaller nesting cycle this year and surprisingly were pretty much civil.

I've started sweeping and mucking. I'm on the 4th cart. Normally I dump it, let it dry, and process it into dirt, but there's no time for that with Obon coming up. I had to thin the floating heart plants. Scott was wanting them cleared on the southwest side just north of the bridge so the trimming clippings would not get all hung up. I went ahead



and cleared a swath on the north end to make it easier to get the broom through.

The fish are still getting some shade. There are quite a few stories about critters and stuff, but there's no time for that. The water is still exceptionally clear.

Everything is good, got to go.

norance, and so forth. The vow is now fulfilled and working as Namo Amida Butsu. So, by hearing the origin and fulfillment of the vow, we recite nembutsu with gratitude for Buddha's compassion and wisdom and self-reflect our daily actions.

I would say that this is the "practice of Jodo Shinshu."Those who encountered the teaching of Jodo Shinshu are self-reflective instead of judgmental of other's actions and peaceful instead of being aggressive on other's faults. This is the personality which Jodo Shinshu practice shapes as I understand and there's no difference of being American or Canadian or Brazilian or Japanese or whatever nationality by following Jodo Shinshu.

Then, how Jodo Shinshu practice is shaped by

Buddhist in America. I think that American Jodo Shinshu is/will dealing/deal with more contemporary issues such as homelessness than Jodo Shinshu followers in Japan.That is a great thing to help others who need help.But it does not mean that all Jodo Shinshu Buddhists "should" or "demanded" to do commit a certain act. Everyone has different personality, capacity, and ability to do things, and we do not force anyone to do something.So, in many ways, I feel that practice of Jodo Shinshu in America is asked to have "acceptance" of those who have different opinions.

Lastly, let me share my experience when I went for volunteer work to help homeless people. When I was in Oregon, I was in an interfaith group who gathered occasionally to volunteer or meetings. Onetime, I went to a volunteer work at one of the afficience out from my mouth naturally. Amida Buddha established and fulfilled the vow as Namo Amida Butsu just for the sake of me who is burdened by the afflictions of seeking for a volunteer work became a cause for me to say the


LDS churches. They have a convenience store type of facility for the homeless people to take needed items for free and I helped refilling the shelves. I was working with clergies of other faith, and after the volunteer work, we took picture together. Then, I posted the picture on my FB saying that "Today, I went to a volunteer work."

But, later, I begun to think that "why did I need to post this picture on my FB page?"Then I realized that that was coming from my afflictions of seeking for a fame and compliment that "Yuki Sensei, you are a great minister!"At that moment, "nanmandabu" came out from my mouth naturally.Amida Buddha established and fulfilled the vow as Namo Amida Butsu just for the sake of me who is burdened by the afflictions of seeking for fame and compliment.So, a volunteer work became nembutsu realizing my nature of possessing the afflictions.

So, what I want to say from this episode is that... we do whatever we do in our lives, but always come back to "self-reflection" of our daily actions and "gratitude" for Amida's great compassion for grasping and never abandoning us.Jodo Shinshu is not about being judgmental of other's action but we are receiving the eves to see ourselves from outside of ourselves.I am sure that we will face a lot of social issues in this modern society, but any actions we choose to take, always come back to selfreflection and gratitude for Amida's great compassion.

I am sure there are various opinions, but this is how I think about this question.
